A High Holiday Meditation Service


Second Day of Rosh Hashanah, Sunday, September 17 / 8:15 to 9 am Naomi Litrownik, LICSW

The concept of a *Kehillah Kedoshah*, sacred community, is at the cornerstone of Judaism. As written by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, a past Chief Rabbi in the United Kingdom, in his book, *Community of Faith*, "Jewish faith is learned and taught, lived, and experienced in community..."

Join Joan Perlman, our new Director of Congregational Learning and Engagement, as she explores the meaning and importance of community in Jewish life and how we can create a sacred space for our children and our adults. Explore and discuss the concept of community as it is framed in the Torah and discover how those early texts serve as a blueprint for community both then and now.

Two Hundred Years of Israel's History through One Family's Experiences

Dan's father's family has lived in Israel since the early 1800s. Two of Dan's great-uncles - one of his grandfather's brothers and one of his grandmother's brothers - each compiled a history of their families, the Winograds and the Makovkys. Some of Dan's grandfather's family came to Israel in 1832 and one side of his grandmother's family has been there even longer. They lived through the rule of the Ottoman Empire, the British Mandate, and the development of modern Israel, including the growth of Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, the Arab revolt of 1921, the 1948 War of Independence, the Six Day War, and the Yom Kippur War. In this Kiddush conversation, Dan will share some of the history and changes that have occurred in Israel from the perspective of his family's experiences.

Biking Through History, Following the Underground Railroad

Join Cantor Linda Sue Sohn and Team Greta (her bike and all its gadgets) as she shares memories of her adventure-of-a-lifetime on the WomanTours Underground Railroad Bike Tour. Riding almost 1500 miles with 28 other women from Fulton, MS to Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, Canada pushed her to new levels of endurance and friendship. She came away learning that anything is possible with the right attitude, good preparation, excellent food to fuel the daily rides, a mind open to willingly face new challenges, and how easy it is to start a conversation with just about anyone when you roll up on a bicycle.

Surviving the Holocaust - My Parents' Experiences

There are relatively few survivors still living and able to add their important stories to our people's collective history of the Holocaust. It is becoming the duty of the second generation to preserve their family stories. Ed's father. Herbert Stein, was born in Berlin in 1926 during the time of the Weimar Republic. His family saw the end of the Republic and the ensuing rise of anti-Semitism under the Nazi regime. Herbert and his parents emigrated to Budapest in June 1942, and the narrative grows even darker. Ed's mother, Ágota Schwartz, was born in Kisvárda, Hungary in 1926. Deportation with her parents and other relatives to the Kisvárda Ghetto in April 1944 was the beginning of her nightmarish story. Deported to Auschwitz, and later to Stutthof, she survived one of the infamous Death Marches in 1945. Both of his parents were liberated by the Soviet Army. They met after the war in a hachshara kibbutz in Budapest. They made their way to the Eschwege DP Camp in the American-occupied zone in Germany, where Ed was born in early 1947. The family journeyed to America in December 1947 aboard the SS Marine Flasher, and in 1952 became citizens.

Healing Hearts in Ecuador

Rob Geggel joined the Por Cristo medical team in 2000 and has since been travelling yearly with the team to Ecuador, providing cardiac treatment for children with congenital heart disease. In this Kiddush Conversation Rob will share stories of his interactions with patients, their families, and medical staff at the Baca Ortiz Hospital in Quito, the principle pediatric tertiary care hospital for Ecuador. High school student translators from the Albert Einstein Jewish Day School in Quito gain experience in medical care and assist the team with translation. Rob will also reflect on the Jewish community in Quito, where he often attends Friday night services during his stay.

Daf Yomi, Hebrew for "page of the day," refers to a daily regimen in which each of the 2,711 pages of Talmud is studied in numerical order. Beginning in January 2020, Rabbi Perkins began studying a page of Talmud each day and joined hundreds of thousands of other scholars who do the same. Following a prescribed schedule, participants are able to complete the entire Talmud in seven years. Join with Rabbi Perkins and fellow congregants to study and discuss a highlight from one of the previous week's Daf Yomi pages. Relevant reading materials will be provided and no advanced preparation is required.

Engaging Palestinian and Israeli Women in Municipal Elections in Israel

Two years after the devastating violence of May 2021, mixed cities in Israel, communities with significant populations of both Jewish and Palestinian citizens, are still dealing with the fallout. The lasting tension in mixed cities provides a unique challenge to shared living, but also a unique opportunity: nowhere else in Israel is the need for partnership more urgent, for Jewish and Palestinian citizens alike. The October 2023 municipal elections could spark the advancement of shared society, and The Abraham Initiatives is working hard to harness this potential. This year, The Abraham Initiatives recruited and trained Palestinian and Jewish women to run for local office in an effort to promote shared society, build a generation of community leaders, and encourage gender parity in politics. Join us as we sit with Lydia Woolley, the North American Program Director at The Abraham Initiatives, to discuss the lead-up to the municipal elections and their wide-ranging implications.


No doubt, at one time or another, we have all experienced the acute or transient insomnia that accompanies change in our lives. Whether the change is good or bad, physical, mental, social or environmental, just about anything can seem to push us into a night or two of insomnia. For most of us, as we adapt or the stressor resolves, so does the insomnia.

However, for some the insomnia seems to take on a life of its own and goes on, sometimes for months or years, beyond the initial trigger. This is a problem worth avoiding and worthy of attention if it happens to you.

This presentation by Dr. Donn Posner will raise and debunk some of the major misconceptions and myths about our sleep. It will go on to discuss some of the basic factors that go into good sleep, how sleep changes over the lifespan, the difference between acute and chronic insomnia, simple strategies that you can employ to get insomnia under control, and where to seek help when insomnia becomes chronic.

Rachel Kalikow, Chief Development Officer, Friends of the Arava Institute, will share examples and talk about how the Arava Institute uses crossborder/cross-cultural environmental education to bring people together and build bridges for peace.

What was perhaps equally extraordinary was that Huberman auditioned both men and women at a time when no women were members of the major European symphony orchestras. The seven women who were hired by Huberman were in every sense pioneers.

The founding female members of the Palestine Symphony Orchestra (PSO) brought knowledge and artistry of both the orchestral and chamber music repertoire. In addition to performing with the orchestra, they formed chamber music ensembles, gave solo recitals, and most importantly music lessons to pass on their knowledge to the next generation. Even when some of the founding members left the orchestra to pursue their musical careers around the world, the intense bonds formed in those early years in Palestine lasted throughout their lives.

In the spring of 2022, in conjunction with International Women's Day, the Israel Philharmonic decided to honor these seven original members of the orchestra, courageous and talented individuals who were the uncelebrated heroes of their time.

This program will feature a brief film, following which, Viola Morse, whose mother was one of the original women in the PSO, will provide a personal perspective. The film is an offshoot of the longer film "Orchestra of Exiles."
